About the Congress and the Host Institutions

Since 1987, the IAAH (www.iaah.org) has organized a World Congress on Adolescent Health every four years. The 11th IAAH World Congress on Adolescent Health is hosted by MAMTA Health Institute for Mother and Child (MAMTA) in association with consortium partners Pathfinder International, Population Foundation of India, Population Services International and the YP Foundation and with scientific and professional association partners, the Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI), the Indian Academy of Pediatrics (IAP), the Federation of Obstetric and Gynecological Societies of India (FOGSI) and the Trained Nurses Association of India (TNAI). The World Congress is being hosted under the supportive leadership of Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India.

The World Congress will focus on the health and wellbeing of 10-24 year olds. It includes attention to:

- Positive youth development, enabling social environments (including gender norms), and other social determinants of health;
- The breadth of health outcomes facing young people: injuries, interpersonal violence, communicable diseases, non-communicable diseases including mental health problems, substance use, and sexual and reproductive health (including STIs, HIV and pregnancy);
- Equity, including attention to age and gender, and to adolescents including those who are LGBTI, disabled, homeless, sex workers or exploited by the sex trade, youth in detention or stateless;
- The range of settings in which young people live and learn and work, and the various platforms available to deliver interventions (eg health facilities, schools, communities, social media, e and m health, and legal frameworks);
- The value of multisector actions and of engaging multiple stakeholders, including government officials and other policy makers, the United Nations community, NGOs, clinicians, public health practitioners, social scientists and researchers and young people themselves.

MAMTA Health Institute for Mother and Child (MAMTA, www.mamta-himc.org) is an Indian non-profit institution that was founded in 1990. It began working with underprivileged communities in an urban slum in New Delhi, and today works in 19 states of India and in South & South East Asia on maternal and child health, HIV, adolescent sexual and reproductive health and rights and non-communicable diseases (NCDs), mental health with growing involvement in adolescent health policies and programmes regionally and internationally. It is part of many national and state-level technical and policy think tanks.

Population Foundation of India (PFI, www.populationfoundation.in) is a national NGO and think tank which advocates for the effective formulation and implementation of gender-sensitive population, health and development strategies and policies. It works with the government and with NGOs in the areas of health, scaling-up of successful pilots and social and behaviour change communication.

Population Services International (PSI, www.psi.org) is a global health organization working in reproductive health, HIV, child survival, non-communicable diseases and sanitation. Partnering with the public sector and harnessing the power of markets, PSI provides life-saving products, services and communications that empower vulnerable populations to lead healthier lives.

TYPF runs programmes and influence policies in the areas of gender, sexuality, health, education and governance.




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Floor Plan (Ground Floor)

Sightseeing in Delhi

Qutub Minar: Qutub Minar is an excellent example of Afghan Architecture. The Minar is a 72.5metres high victory tower, the construction of which was started in the final year of the twelfth century by Qutubuddin Aibak and was later completed by his successor. It has been given World Heritage Site status.

Gandhi Smiriti: The Memorial includes Visual Aspects to perpetuate the memory of Mahatma Gandhi and the noble ideals he represented, Educative Aspects to focus concentrated attention on the values that made Gandhi a "Mahatma", and Services. On display in the Museum are photographs, sculptures, paintings, frescos, inscriptions on rocks and relics pertaining to the years Mahatma Gandhi spent here. The meagre personal effects of Gandhiji are carefully preserved and exhibited.

Red Fort: Built by Shahjahan, the builder of the Taj Mahal in Agra. The construction lasted from 1639 to 1648. The Red Fort is closed on Mondays, while the Old Fort is only open on Mondays.

Rajghat: This simple square platform of black marble marks the place where the father of the Nation, Mahatma Gandhi, was cremated.

Humayun's Tomb: Built by Humayun's widow, Queen Haji Begum in the 16th century, it is reputed to have been the prototype of the Taj Mahal at Agra.

Swaminarayan Akshardham Temple: Thought to be the epitome of Indian culture, spirituality and architecture, Swaminarayan Akshardham Temple is a Hindu temple built in 2005. Sitting near the banks of the Yamuna river, the temple showcases Hinduism and its age old culture. Dedicated to Lord Swaminarayan, Akshardham is in the Guinness Book of World Records as the World's Largest Comprehensive Hindu Temple.

Lotus temple: Commonly known as Lotus temple, it is a Bahá'í House of Worship. The Lotus Temple is open to all, regardless of religion or any other distinction. It is situated near Mandir Marg in Kalkaji, New Delhi.

Shopping in Delhi

Delhi is a hub for shopping. From the oldest to the latest, you can buy every kind of clothing you want. Shopping in Delhi can be utterly extravagant or amazingly inexpensive. India's capital city is among the most exciting places to buy textiles (fabric as well as ready-to-wear clothes), jewellery, shoes, bags, leather, carpets, handicrafts, traditional and contemporary Indian art and curios. Several leading designers have boutiques and showrooms in Delhi.

Among many other places, Sadar Bazaar specializes in wholesale goods for daily use; Nehru Place for electronic goods; and Karol Bagh for traditional clothing. Sarojini Nagar and Lajpat Nagar are two local markets in Delhi. Connaught Place, Chawri Bazaar, Chandni Chowk, Khan Market, Greater Kailash M Block Market, Ambience Mall, Select City Walk Mall, Pacific Mall, etc. are other shopping precincts in Delhi. Janpath is a great place for bargain hunting, with kiosks selling cotton clothes, curios, silver jewellery and brassware. Central Cottage Industries Emporium (CCIE) is a good 'one-stop-shop' to explore handicrafts from different parts of India. On Baba Kharak Singh Marg, there are several state handicraft emporia, which provide an opportunity to see a wide range of woodcarving, painting, sculpture and other arts of India. 
